



Who to call about shooting in Texas.

The Texas Film Commission, the eleven regional film commissions, and the 218 Film Friendly Texas certified communities. What each one does, who to call, and which questions belong where.

How this is organized.

There are about two dozen organizations in Texas with the word “film” in the name. They do three different jobs, and calling the wrong one costs a week.

One state office runs the money. The Texas Film Commission administers the grant, the sales-tax exemptions, the statewide crew and locations databases, and the community certification program. It has no regional branches. Every state-level question in Texas arrives at the same building in Austin.

Eleven regional commissions run the ground. City departments, convention and visitors bureaus and chambers, funded locally. Permits, local locations, crew lists, and the call to the police department about a street closure. Three of them run their own incentive on top of the state grant.

218 certified communities have a named local liaison. Film Friendly Texas certifies towns, not productions. Certification has no effect on your grant. What it gets you is a person whose job includes your call and written filming rules instead of an improvised answer.

Every entry was read off the organization’s own website on September 5, 2026. Where an office’s own site and the Texas Film Commission’s directory disagree, both are shown and the disagreement is noted. Nothing here was taken from a directory aggregator, a news story, or a professional networking profile.

This guide does not interpret the incentive program, and neither does the company that publishes it. Every interpretive question routes to the Texas Film Commission at 512-463-9200. In April 2026 the Commission put it plainly: “the Texas Film Commission is the first, last and only source you should trust when it comes to anything TMIIP-related.” That is the rule this guide follows.

This document goes stale. Rates change, staff move, and two of the pages cited here were already out of date on the day they were read. Re-verify anything you are about to put in a budget. The online edition is corrected quarterly.

What the Commission runs.

1. The Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program (TMIIP).

A cash grant paid after the production ends and the spending is verified. It is not a transferable tax credit. It cannot be sold and it cannot be financed against.

Read off gov.texas.gov/film/page/tmiip on September 5, 2026. Animation and VFX follow the film/TV or commercial column by project type. Cast and crew figures include extras.

The 35% is a scheduled figure, not a constant. Under Texas Government Code §485.023(2) the residency requirement steps to 40% for projects beginning principal photography on or after September 1, 2027, then 45% on September 1, 2029, then 50% on September 1, 2031. The trigger is the date principal photography begins, not the application date. The Commission's own program page shows 35% with no staircase on it.

Additional grant awards, and the trap in them.

The Commission's Additional Grant Awards page states that a project may be eligible for multiple additional grants, that the total may not exceed 31% of eligible in-state spending, that the selections must be made on the project application, and that awards will not be granted retroactively. An uplift you did not select at application is gone, however well you documented it.

- Veteran percentage, 2.5%. Texas resident veterans as 5% of combined paid crew and cast including extras. Needs a Declaration of Texas Residency plus discharge documentation, DD214.
- Postproduction, 1%. 25% of total eligible in-state spending during postproduction. Labor, vendors and music costs count.

- Rural filming, 2.5%. At least 35% of filming days or man hours in a Texas county of 300,000 people or fewer.
- Workforce development, 2.5%. Partner with a Texas institution of higher education for workforce development during production.
- Texas historic site, 2.5%. Use historic sites in Texas as filming locations.
- Texas heritage, 2.5%, and faith-based, 2.5%. Both read “according to rules adopted by the office.” The February 2026 proposed rules said both would be addressed in a future rulemaking, and the page lists them as selectable anyway. Ask the Commission before counting either.

Do not model off 31%. It is a ceiling, not an entitlement, and each uplift carries its own test. Quote the base rate and confirm with the Commission before anything reaches a budget.

2. Film Friendly Texas.

Certifies communities, not productions. Established 2007. See the community list later in this guide.

3. The Texas Production Directory.

Crew and support services in two separate searchable databases, free to list. Requires one paid, verifiable credit per category. As of February 2026 it carries veteran status, which connects directly to the veterans uplift. tpd@gov.texas.gov.

4. Location services.

A statewide locations database, open to property submissions from anyone. This is the library staff search when a production asks what Texas has.

5. The Media Production Development Zone Act.

A sales and use tax exemption for constructing, expanding, improving or renovating a production facility at a designated location, for up to two years. Sound stages, post houses, animation and CGI studios, game studios, production offices. Established 2009, administered by the Commission.

Five approvals in order: the local municipality or county certifies the project for local benefits and forwards it; the Comptroller certifies a positive impact on state revenue; a Comptroller-appointed advisory committee recommends the exemption; the Commission designates the location and certifies the project.

6. Sales tax exemptions and refunds.

Separate from the grant and stackable with it. Covers items and services necessary to and used or consumed directly during production of a project intended for commercial distribution. Not available for productions not sold to the public, which the Commission illustrates with wedding videos and social media. The Commission’s own page says taxes are administered by the Comptroller and that its summary is not the complete text of the law.

The eleven regional film commissions.

These are not branches of the state office. They are city departments, convention and visitors bureaus and chambers, funded locally. Contacts below are as the Texas Film Commission publishes them, cross-checked against each office's own site on September 5, 2026.

Almost none of them issue your permit. Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston coordinate; a city department issues. Austin states it twice on its own site. San Antonio and El Paso are the exceptions and handle permits directly. Assuming the film office is the permitting authority is the most common way to lose a week.

Two things the state page gets wrong.

The Commission's regional film commissions page carries a dropdown offering twelve commissions above a page listing eleven, and they are not the same eleven. Northeast Texas Regional Film Commission is in the dropdown and appears nowhere on the page. South Padre Island Film Commission is in the dropdown and its anchor on the page is an empty heading with no contact information. Conroe is on the page but not in the dropdown. Selecting Corpus Christi jumps nowhere because its anchor does not exist, though its contact block is present further down.

South Padre Island does exist and is reachable: it runs a film page through the City's convention and visitors bureau at visitsouthpadreisland.com/film, info@sopadre.com. The Northeast Texas Regional Film Commission is harder to pin down. The domain associated with it, netexasmovies.com, did not respond when it was checked on September 5, 2026, and no phone or email for the commission was found on any page. If you need northeast Texas, go to the individual certified communities instead: Atlanta, Bonham, Carthage, Farmersville, Greenville, Kilgore, Marshall, Mineola, Nacogdoches, Palestine, Paris, Pittsburg, Quitman, Terrell, Texarkana, Tyler and Winnsboro are all in the Film Friendly network.

Five cities, one locations platform.

Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio all run Reel-Scout. The search behaves the same way in five cities, and a crew or vendor listing has to be entered five separate times. The Texas Film Commission runs its own statewide instance at tx.reel-scout.com, which is where the Film Friendly community liaison records and community location photos live. El Paso runs a custom directory and issues access by emailed link.

Permits, city by city.

There is no statewide film permit in Texas. Permission is municipal, it is issued by whoever owns the ground you are standing on, and the rules change at the city line. A production crossing the Metroplex deals with Dallas, Fort Worth and Arlington as three separate applications with three different lead times.

The film office usually does not issue your permit. Of the eleven regional commissions, three issue directly: San Antonio, El Paso and Corpus Christi. Arlington and Brownsville take the application and route it inside the city. The rest coordinate while a city department issues, and two of the eleven publish no film permit at all. Austin says it twice on its own site, in bold: “The Austin Film Commission does not issue permits.” Houston’s registration form says in its own words that it “is NOT a permit to film on City, County, State, Federal or Private property.”

ALSO NEEDS	The Stockyards has its own insurance requirement and filming kit. City parks, DFW Airport and Fort Worth ISD schools are separate. Drones need FAA approval.

Houston

WHO ISSUES	No single City of Houston film permit is published. The commission runs a registration that is explicitly not a permit.
HOW TO APPLY	Submit the commission's Motion Picture/TV Registration form before production, with a certificate of insurance. Then handle each department separately.
LEAD TIME	Not published. The registration asks for it "prior to production."
FEE	Not published.
INSURANCE	"The use of general public property requires that the production company supply the City of Houston with a liability insurance certificate in the aggregate amount of one million dollars per incident."
ALSO NEEDS	Parks go to Houston Parks and Recreation. Traffic and pedestrian control goes to the Houston Police Department. Pyrotechnics and special effects go to the Houston Fire Department. Which department handles a street closure is not stated on either the commission's or the City's pages; ask the commission.

ALSO NEEDS	Drones are not permitted over the River Walk. Separate approvals for the Alamo, the San Antonio Missions, Confluence Park, the Japanese Tea Gardens, the McNay, Pearl, Main Plaza and the Botanical Gardens. The commission coordinates street closures, police rentals and fire and safety services, but does not set rates or availability for private locations.

LEAD TIME	“The permit process takes 3-5 working days to complete, so please submit your permit application a minimum of 5 working days prior to your first requested day to film.”
FEE	“The cost is \$40.00 for up to 5 city locations.”
INSURANCE	Certificate naming the City of El Paso as additional insured. Published minimums vary by activity: general liability \$250,000 to \$3,000,000, automobile \$500,000 to \$3,000,000, aircraft \$5,000,000, plus workers’ compensation.

WHO ISSUES	City of Arlington, Communication and Legislative Affairs. The film commission is the front door and sits inside the city.
HOW TO APPLY	FilmApp portal for the Application for Commercial Filming.
LEAD TIME	“Request must be submitted at least 10 business days before principal day of filming.” The city renders a decision “within fifteen (15) days of receiving a fully and technically complete application.”
FEE	“While the City’s Application for Commercial Filming is free, please note that some permits require the payment of associated fees.” Those amounts are not published.
INSURANCE	\$1,000,000 general liability and, where applicable, \$1,000,000 automobile liability, naming the City of Arlington and its agents, officers, elected officials, employees and assigns as additional insured. Workers’ compensation or an umbrella policy may also be required.
ALSO NEEDS	Parks need a separate Photography/Filming Permit from Parks and Recreation. Street closures need a Temporary Traffic Control Permit from Public Works. Pyrotechnics and open flame go to the Fire Prevention Division. Drones need a commercial pilot license, certificate of registration, insurance and FAA airspace approval.

FEE	Not published on either the commission's or the city's site. Ask before you assume it is free.

Corpus Christi

WHO ISSUES	The Film Commission issues the permit, which the city's filming ordinance states directly. This is unusual in Texas and it is the shortest route of the eleven.
HOW TO APPLY	No application form or portal is published. Contact the commission. A permit is required only for filming that takes exclusive use of public property; filming that does not exclude the public does not require one.
LEAD TIME	A minimum of 3 business days for commercials and episodic television, 5 business days for feature films.
FEE	\$25.
INSURANCE	\$1,000,000 general liability and not less than \$500,000 automobile liability, naming both the City of Corpus Christi and the Corpus Christi Film Commission as additional insured. The ordinance allows insurance to be waived case by case.
ALSO NEEDS	No separate beach filming permit is published. The city's special event, beach vendor and beach parking permits are for other activities and do not cover filming.
CONTACT	film@visitcorpuschristi.com , (361) 561-2000. Figures here are from the city's filming ordinance, Chapter 36 Article III, as adopted in October 2021. Confirm current terms with the commission when you apply.

Amarillo

WHO ISSUES	No City of Amarillo film permit is published. The Greater Amarillo Film Commission coordinates and routes you outward.
HOW TO APPLY	For a street or sidewalk closure, a special event application goes to the city's Traffic Engineering Department. There is no film-specific form.
LEAD TIME	Not published for filming.
FEE	Not published for filming. The special event permit has its own fee, which is not a film figure and should not be planned around as one.
INSURANCE	Not published for filming. The special event process asks for the City of Amarillo as certificate holder, which is a weaker requirement than additional insured.
ALSO NEEDS	This is the best-routed of the eleven for surrounding jurisdictions. Potter County roads (806) 379-2900. Randall County roads (806) 468-5800. Palo Duro Canyon State Park goes to Texas Parks and Wildlife. Alibates Flint Quarries and Lake Meredith go to the National Park Service. Interstates and Farm-to-Market roads go to the Texas Film Commission. Cadillac Ranch is privately owned and booked separately.

Conroe

WHO ISSUES	No City of Conroe film permit is published. The Conroe Film Commission sits in the CVB and coordinates only.
HOW TO APPLY	The city's special event process is the nearest published route, by email to the permits department. Whether a shoot actually goes through it is not stated anywhere the city publishes.
LEAD TIME	Not published for filming.
FEE	Not published for filming.
INSURANCE	Not published for filming. The special event process requires additional insured status.
ALSO NEEDS	Nothing film-specific published.
CONTACT	Call the commission first, (936) 522-3503, info@visitconroe.com . This is the one city of the eleven where the route genuinely has to be established by phone.

Past the city line.

A location that is not city property has its own owner, and the city permit does not reach it. The routes that come up most often:

- State property and state highways. The Texas Film Commission handles state property at (512) 463-9200. TxDOT handles state highway right-of-way.
- The Texas Capitol and its grounds. The State Preservation Board, (512) 463-3051.
- State parks. Texas Parks and Wildlife, through its own park use application. Palo Duro Canyon, Big Bend Ranch and the rest all run through TPWD, not the nearest city.
- National parks and monuments. The National Park Service commercial film and photo permit process. Big Bend, Lake Meredith and Alibates all sit here.

- County roads. The county, not the city. Amarillo's film office publishes both Potter and Randall county numbers; most do not, so start with the county judge's office.
- Airports. DFW International, and every commercial field, permit separately from the city they serve.
- Universities. Campus filming is the university's call. The University of Texas runs utfilming@utexas.edu; other systems have their own.
- River authorities and utilities. LCRA parks are filming@lcra.org, (512) 300-4031.

Two things to settle on the first call, before the location scout. First, who actually signs: the film office, a city department, or a landowner who is not the city. Second, the certificate of insurance, because the named additional insured differs city to city and a certificate naming the wrong entity is the most common reason a permit sits. Corpus Christi wants two parties named. Amarillo's special event process asks only for a certificate holder. Arlington wants the city plus its agents, officers, elected officials, employees and assigns.

Film Friendly Texas.

When people ask which cities are “in the Texas Film Commission program,” this is almost always the program they mean, and it is not the grant.

Film Friendly Texas, established in 2007, certifies communities. A town certifies by doing four things, in the Commission’s own words:

1. Establish an official Film Friendly Texas liaison within the community who is affiliated with a local government organization and will facilitate requests for on-location filming.
2. Attend a “How to Become a Film Friendly Texas Certified Community” workshop hosted by the Texas Film Commission.
3. Pass administratively enforceable filming guidelines that promote media production in a way that is mutually beneficial for residents and industry professionals.
4. Submit photos of a minimum of five filming locations in the community for the Texas Film Commission location database.

The liaison must be employed by a division of the city or county government. The Commission advises sending someone from a city or county office, the CVB, the chamber, or the EDC.

What certification does and does not do.

What it gets a production: a named local person whose job includes your call, written filming rules rather than an improvised answer, and inclusion in the network the Commission reaches in one email with a location request or a casting call.

What it does not get you: money. Certification has no effect on your grant, your rate, or whether your project qualifies. A production shooting in an uncertified town is just as eligible.

There are currently no workshops scheduled. The Commission’s workshops page reads “Upcoming Film Friendly Texas Workshop dates to be announced.” Attendance is a required certification step, so a community that wants to certify cannot finish until dates are posted. If you are advising a town on this, that is the blocker.

Finding the liaison for a specific town.

The Commission’s certified-communities map is the maintained source. Each pin links through to that community’s contact record and location photographs on the Commission’s statewide system at tx.reel-scout.com. Liaison names are not reproduced here: 218 of them go stale faster than any PDF can track, and the map is corrected when they change.

The 218 certified communities.

The 206 communities below are grouped by the region the State of Texas assigns each one in its open data portal, so the grouping is the state's and not ours. Twelve more are on the Commission's map without a region in the dataset yet; they are listed at the end.

The count is a moving number. The Commission's map carried 218 communities when it was read on September 5, 2026. The State of Texas open data portal lists 206, and the graphic on the Commission's own page is captioned through May 2025. The map is the newer source, and towns keep certifying. Treat any total here as a snapshot with a date on it, and check the map before you rely on a count.

Other city and county film offices.

Each entry below was read on September 5, 2026. “Not published” means the office’s own site does not show it. Where a page hides an email behind a form or an obfuscator, the phone number is the working route.
